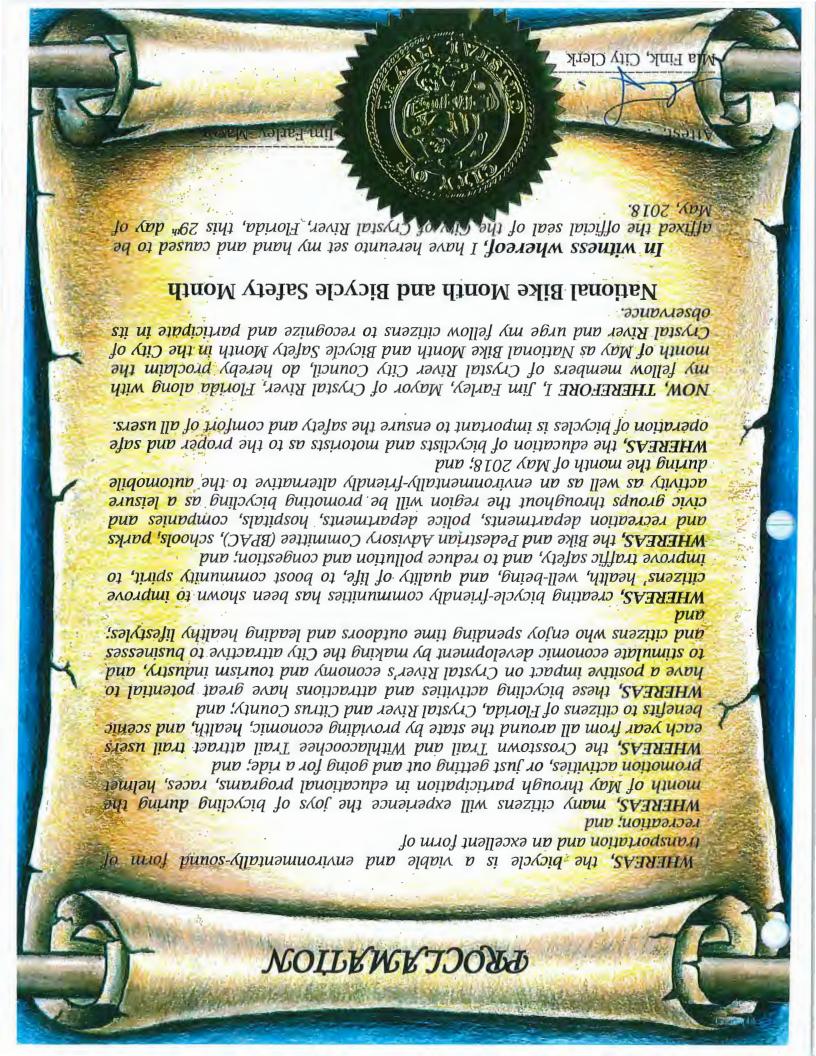

Minutes of the Crystal River City Council Regular Council Meeting Monday, April 23rd, 2018 @ 7:00 p.m. Council Chamber, City Hall

1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Farley called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Council Present: Mayor Farley, Vice Mayor Brown, Council member Fitzpatrick, Council member Gudis, Council member Holmes

Council Absent:

Staff Present: Finance Director Michelle Russell, City Attorney Jennifer Rey, City Clerk Fink, Public Works Director Beau Keene, Special Events Coordinator Leslie Bollin and Planning and Development Services Director Jackie Gorman.

Mayor Farley led in the Pledge of Allegiance and Council member Holmes led the invocation. Mayor Farley recognized Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Josh Wooten; County Commissioner Brian Coleman; and Joe Meek, Chamber of Commerce Board Chair.

2. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Motion to adopt the agenda was made by Vice Mayor Brown; seconded by Council member Gudis. Motion carried 5-0.

Summary: In February of 2018 Planning Commission At-Large Seat No. 6 became vacant. Planning Commissioner Gregory Acker, previously holding Alternate Seat No. 2, is recommended for appointment to At-Large Seat No. 6.

The City Clerk's Office received an application from Michael Martin in March of 2018. Staff has reviewed the application and found that Mr. Martin is eligible to serve on the Planning Commission.

6. PUBLIC INPUT

(Time Limit of Three Minutes)

<u>Phillis Rosetti- 209 SE Paradise Rd.</u> – Expressed concerns regarding USFWS Management Plan, including lack of performance measures, reimbursement clause,= and discretionary authority of Refuge Manager, and noting the direct impact Three Sisters Springs has on the local community.

<u>Julie Morris- USFWS Association-</u> Discussed USFWS conservation and wildlife advocacy mission and spoke in favor of a continued multi-agency partnership, noting benefits including leveraged resources and federal funding, and acknowledging challenges of navigating bureaucracies.

<u>Joan Luebbe- 1004 SE 5th Avenue-</u> Discussed past actions by the Friends of the CRNWR and advocacy efforts for a continued partnership and spoke in favor of the City's Alternative Management Plan, noting funding certainty, efficiency of local government, and affordable ticket pricing.

<u>Dr. Harley Barnett-</u> Discussed his experience as a videographer for manatee documentaries (provided a copy to Council), expressing concerns regarding river degradation, environmental impact and potential consequences of losing federal funding and support and noting challenges and benefits of federal-local partnerships.

<u>Phil Jannarone- Paradise Point Road-</u> Discussed the manatee tourism industry and benefits of privatization.

<u>Jack Huegel- 743 SE 1st Court-</u> Spoke in favor of the City's Alternative management Plan, commended staff, and expressed concerns regarding the twenty year term, reimbursement clause, state of the property and recalled past USFWS management actions.

Trisha Green- Read a comment on behalf of Mary Morgan (ATTACHMENT A).

<u>Liz Kleen-Wildlife Biologist- USFWS-</u> Noted errors in a prior draft of the City's Alternative Management Plan, and spoke in favor of continued management by, listed current USFWS contributions and expressed concerns regarding City management including discontinuation of Refuge Days.

<u>Janis Huegel-743 SE 1st Court-</u> Spoke in favor of City's Alternative Management plan, noting city contributions including related to access and quality of service, and funding certainty under local management. She also expressed concerns regarding continued management under USFWS, noting lack of on-site improvements and timely reporting.

Zoe Morris-Crystal River- Spoke in favor of City's Alternative Management Plan, noting local government ability to best identify community needs.

<u>Mike Engiles- Crystal River Watersports-</u> Discussed the efforts of Three Sisters Springs Community Working Group and timing of the recommendations presented in April of 2017, noting Council's vote to begin process for renegotiations in May of 2017, expressed concerns regarding a lack of opportunity for the current Refuge Manager to move forward with vetted recommendations. He also expressed concerns regarding lack of clarity in the City's comparison document, specifically related to policy and how manatee

tours will be affected under the City's Alternative Management Plan, noting a recent ordinance requiring tour vessels to obtain decals.

Robert McClinton- Crystal River Watersports-Mermaid Tails- Discussed the spike in local population over the past decade and expressed concerns regarding City's ability to manage.

<u>Gail Kostelnick-2021 NW 13th Street-</u> Spoke in favor of continued USFWS management of Three Sisters Springs, noting her recent letter published in the Chronicle and another by former City Manager Andy Houston, expressing concerns regarding ability of city staff and funding.

<u>Cindy Guy- 1301 SE 4th Avenue- Majestic Manatee- Majestic Wedding Chapel-</u> Spoke in favor of continued USFWS management of Three Sisters Springs, discussing the on-the-water role of manatee tour companies, ineffectiveness of city's Water Enforcement tour companies and the impact of the City's trolley service on the local manatee tour operations.

<u>Broderick Jenkins-Crystal River-</u> Discussed the costly nature of ending partnerships, speaking in favor of a continued partnership, and encouraging Council to enhance the existing arrangement through contributions.

Ron Ross- Gulf Coast Expeditions- Discussed the role of tour operators and volunteers in on the water enforcement and education, noting efforts of tour operators to fill vacancies during sequester, and expressing concerns regarding city's understanding of responsibility and cost of enforcement and oversight.

<u>Capt. John Spann- Plantation-</u> Discussed importance and uniqueness of the swim-with program, expressing concerns regarding potential liabilities and city's ability to handle manatee protection and enforcement, and the critical nature of protecting manatees and the program.

Mayor Farley confirmed that the City's Alternative Management Plan did not involve ending the swim-with program.

<u>Capt. Mike Dunn-</u> Spoke in favor of a continued partnership, noting challenges in a partnership and the importance of protecting manatees.

Captain Jim-Spoke in favor of a continued partnership, and cost of failing to get along.

<u>Pete Langolis- Crystal River-</u> Discussed concerns regarding City assuming sole management of the site including size of the community and risk involved.

<u>Charles Lee- Audobon FL- Director of Advocacy-</u> Spoke in favor of a continued partnership, as necessary to preserving and protecting a natural resource, and discussed the timeline of events that led up to acquisition of the site and development of the current management plan and agreement.

<u>Pat Rose-Save the Manatee Club-</u> Spoke in agreement with Mr. Lee's previous comments, noting the collaborative effort to obtain the property, original vision for the partnership, and working group recommendations, and noting concerns with each of the draft proposals.

<u>Josh Wooten- City County Chamber of Commerce-</u> Spoke in agreement with Mr. Rose's previous comments, providing a brief history of the collaborative acquisition effort, noting community involvement, the National Geographic article about the site and surrounding area, and the need to continue working through a partnership.

<u>Kennedy Smith-Crystal River</u>—Discussed concerns regarding the USFWS Management Plan, noting the twenty year term and funding uncertainty, suggesting investment in the site be placed in ESCROW.

<u>Tom Gotterup- 6083 W. Fairhope Ct. - Friends of the CRNWR President-</u> Thanked former City Manager Andy Houston, Chamber of Commerce staff, Mike Engiles, META and the Friends, compared the number of comments in favor of City management with those in favor of USFWS management of continued partnership, and expressed concerns that state appropriated funding cited in City's plan was not guaranteed.

Council member Holmes requested comments received from Dee Atkins via email be entered into the record (ATTACHMENT B).

City Attorney Rey presented a memo regarding Three Sisters Springs property management (ATTACHMENT C) focused on liability and enforcement concerns.

9. CITY MANAGER

A. Discussion and comparison of the two proposals for Three Sister Springs Property by United States Fish and Wildlife Service and City of Crystal River Staff

<u>Background</u>: [Agenda Sheet Information Only: Presentations, discussion and comparison of the two proposals for Three Sister Springs Property by United States Fish and Wildlife Service and City of Crystal River Staff.

Summary: City Staff and Representatives from United States Fish and Wildlife will make verbal or Power Point presentations on highlights of the attached plans and address City Council questions related to the each proposal and the differences.

As current management entity for the property, USFWS will first outline their plan and address Council questions.

City staff will then outline the alternate management plan for the property and address Council questions.

City Attorney will also provide input on the two plans from a legal perspective.

Open discussion to follow related to each plan as presented with staff and/or USFWS Representative to address any further questions.

<u>Ernie Clark – Area Supervisor- USFWS-</u> Expressed full support for Refuge Manager Joyce Palmer, noting her collaborative approach and benefits of incrementalist pace of federal government action. He confirmed USFWS commitment to continued partnership, continued representation as stewards of CRNWR and active participants in community.

Mayor Farley acknowledged presence of Jonathan Torres, representing Senator Marco Rubio's Office.

Refuge Manager Joyce Palmer distributed a revised comparative analysis table to Council members (received after agenda deadline) (ATTACHMENT D) and presents PowerPoint "Three Sisters Springs Management Plan" (ATTACHMENT E).

She discussed the purpose of the long term agreement to ensure that USFWS will be a party for the lifetime of any facilities that are put in place, the purpose of the reimbursement clause due to federal appropriations law, and noting provisions that may be made in the event that the city managed the site independently, including monthly presence of a USFWS biologist and manatee education.

Council discussion was then held regarding proposed agreements terms, site facilities and improvements, benefits of a coordination committee, funding concerns, and local decision making authority by USFWS leadership during which Ms. Palmer addressed Council questions and provided clarification. Further Council discussion was held regarding issues related to public access, future site development, interagency communications, and recent events leading up to renegotiation of the management plan during which Council member Holmes spoke in favor of termination if the current agreement with USFWS and adop0tion of the City's Alternative Plan proposal.

City Manager Burnell then discussed the Alternative Management Plan, providing an overview of events leading up to the renegotiations and noting potential federal funding shortfalls. He also discussed water quality improvement and other capital projects completed by the city, and other efforts to address on the water issues. He provided an overview of events leading up to the city's development of the Three Sisters Springs Visitor Center and Trolley tour, noting future funding secured for the site and cost cutting measures including seasonal employment. He also discussed how potential issues, such as attendance levels and volunteer staffing, would be addressed. He expressed concerns regarding USFWS plan provisions including capital funding reimbursement, limited city discretion, and increased admission cost. He spoke in favor of city's proposal, but noted that staff will support Council decision.

He also addressed Council member Gudis' questions regarding enterprise funding levels and affordability. Council member Holmes also provided confirmation that he was in favor of termination of existing agreement and City management of property. Council member Fitzpatrick inquired about enterprise funding levels for past and prior seasons, for which City Manager Burnell provided clarification noting establishment of a capital fund to cover slow seasons.

Mayor Farley discussed the comparison document and expressed concerns regarding long term sustainability and funding uncertainty based on factors including economy and weather.

He also spoke in favor of a continued partnership and discussed ways in which the City could help to decrease cost and increase efficiency, including in-house treatment of invasives and commended the current manager.

Vice Mayor Brown spoke in favor of a continued partnership with USFWS, commending efforts of all management entities, including SWFWMD for their on-site restoration projects, discussing original intent of the management agreement and plan, and expressing concerns regarding uncertainty of future Council's decisions. He discussed the benefits of a continued partnership under USFWS proposed plan including USFWS scientific expertise and coordination committee, and noted concerns regarding City's proposed plan including liabilities and funding uncertainty.

Council member Fitzpatrick spoke in favor of a continued partnership with USFWS, commending staff efforts and the resulting dialogue, noting risks associated with assuming sole management responsibility, and noting concerns with proposed reimbursement clause and potential sequestration.

Council member Holmes spoke in favor of the City's Alternative Plan, noting continued and ongoing revisions to each, issues presented by the City Attorney, and the need to continue negotiations.

Council member Gudis discussed the nature of the partnership, expressing concerns regarding the USFWS Draft Management Plan, including the 2 year term, revenue sharing and increased admission cost, and noting the need for further negotiation.

Council member Fitzpatrick noted the preference of continuing under the current plan and agreement and Council member Gudis noted that the current arrangement could be improved.

 Motion to approve the United States Fish and Wildlife Services Plan for management of the Three Sisters Springs property

<u>Background</u>: [Agenda Sheet Requested Motion: Motion to approve the April 2018 United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) Draft Management Plan for the Three Sisters Springs Property.

Summary: The USFWS can play a vital role in management of Three Sisters Springs and would like to continue managing the property. The Crystal River National Wildlife Refuge has been working cooperatively with the City to update the management plan and intends to work together with the City to develop the property as mutually agreed upon. The Refuge has assisted the City in meeting the intent of the Florida Communities Trust in granting funds to the City for purchase of the property and 19 of the 21 covenants have been initiated, are ongoing, or have been completed. We are prepared to invest significant funding into permanent structures, given certain conditions including a long-term lease to invest funds on lands not federally owned, sharing of entrance fees collected, and the ability to implement the plan once approved by City Council.

The USFWS has developed infrastructure for public access and enjoyment, including an access road, a 1,500-foot boardwalk, a picnic pavilion, temporary entrance gate, and 1.75 miles of trails. Next steps include construction of a permanent entry gate and booth, landscaping, and fencing at the public entrance off Three Sisters Springs Trail; new interpretive panels on existing trails; permanent public restrooms; manatee viewing platforms along Magnolia Springs; an observation platform for viewing wetland wildlife (herons, egrets and fish); and trail improvements, including wheelchair accessible surfaces. The USFWS will also develop environmental interpretation and education programs to connect people with nature at this unique site.

Motion to approve the April 2018 United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) Draft Management Plan for the Three Sisters Springs Property was made by Council member Fitzpatrick; seconded by Vice Mayor Brown.

City Attorney Rey reminded Council of some outstanding contractual items to be addressed, including valuation of capital investment and reimbursement and suggested amending motion to include language to provide policy direction to staff to iron out critical points and for Council to come back for final approval of plan and actual agreement. Discussion was then held with Ms. Palmer distinguishing management plans from actual management agreements.

Motion to amend the original motion to include language as suggested by City Attorney Rey (underlined portion below) was made by Council member Fitzpatrick; seconded by Vice Mayor Brown.

Motion to approve the <u>draft</u> United States Fish and Wildlife Services Plan for management of the Three Sisters Springs property <u>with direction to staff and USFWS to iron out critical points (as</u>

<u>discussed</u>) for Council to come back for approval of final management plan and corresponding <u>agreement</u>. Motion as amended carried 3-2 (Council member Gudis and Council member Holmes in opposition).

C. Motion to approve the City of Crystal River's Alternate Plan for management of the Three Sister Springs property

<u>Background</u>: [Agenda Sheet Requested Motion: Motion to approve the City of Crystal River's Alternate Plan to manage the Three Sister Springs property.

Summary: This alternate plan has been developed in response to a unanimous vote by the Crystal River City Council (City) to put United States Fish & Wildlife Service (Service) on notice for failing to meet contractual obligations of the Management Plan (Plan) The Plan is a document containing contractual obligations the City must meet, with Florida Community Trust (FCT) as trustee of the property. The original intent was to have the Service manage and do the majority of improvements on site as documented in the 2010 Plan which shows capital and operational goals.

Originally, the City did not plan to have any responsibility relating to site operations. The Service requested that the City help meet the public access requirements of FCT and to assist in public education on the water. This was due to public outcry, poor visitor experiences, along with funding and regulatory issues within the Service. The City's role changed substantially over time in order to meet public demand for use of the property. City Council agreed to assist and the City took on the majority of operational functions at Three Sisters Springs, with the City having the most to lose. Crystal River was once a fishing village, then became a bedroom community for Duke Energy, and now it has become a tourist destination for outdoor water-related activities. Good or bad, this has become the life blood of our community.

The City now operates a Welcome Center, provides transportation in and out of Three Sisters, manages all visitors to the Three Sisters site and employs fourteen full or part-time personnel during manatee season. This year's budget included all required positions to operate independently utilizing no City tax dollars. The capital investment to meet many of the required improvements is also addressed with no City tax dollars expended.

This alternate plan lays out how the City would operate Three Sisters Springs without the Service's management. The intent of the original plan does not change as described in the original Executive Summary, except for changing the manager of the property from the Service to the City. The Crystal River National Wildlife Refuge (CRNWR) will remain but the Three Sisters and the three springs would be excluded if this alternate plan is approved. This plan will require FCT approval.

Staff Recommendation: Senior staff members have agreed and believe the operations/ management accomplished to date at Three Sister Springs and development of an alternate plan that is realistic is the best choice for the City of Crystal River. It achieves the following: Local accountability, lower ticket price, all monies collected remain local, maintains superior customer service, ability to adjust to changing environments, better assures site improvements that will be approved by Council and the citizens of Crystal River have an opportunity for direct input, an opportunity for improved local pride in our City, policies and development to enhance changes to promote local usage.

All Senior staff members will however respect and follow whatever determination by City Council. End of Agenda Sheet]

We have been asked to advise the City Council on the legal issues associated with Three Sisters Springs and the future management of the property. To this end, there are five areas of focus where legal liability arises: Contractual Liability, Financial Liability, Personal Injury Liability, Environmental Liability, and Enforcement Concerns.

Contractual Liability

Based on the funding sources for the acquisition of Three Sisters Springs, the City committed to meeting the obligations set forth in the Florida Community Trust Declaration of Restrictive Covenants. Some of these Declarations have been completed to date; others have not. Certain Declarations require an ongoing commitment on behalf of the City. To date, the City has delegated the completion of these Declarations to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (the "Service"). Should the City decide to continue with a Management Plan with the Service, it is suggested that the agreement clearly delineate how the Service will meet each of the obligations under the Declarations and that a timetable with deadlines be established so that all parties are clear on what obligations need to be met or performed by a date certain. Furthermore, where Declarations require construction or development of capital improvements or structures, it should also be clearly delineated on what process will be used to determine where the improvements or structures will be constructed and how their design will be determined. Not having clear guidance to address these issues may delay compliance with the Declarations. Finally, to the extent the agreed upon improvements deviate from the FCT grant agreement or application, the parties would be wise to obtain approval from the FCT to ensure the project maintains an appropriate level of points to support the grant.

In the event the City chooses, to terminate its Management Agreement with the Service, then the City becomes solely responsible for completing and maintaining the commitments set forth in the Declaration. Some of the ongoing obligations under the Declarations include:

- Annual scheduled educational classes or programs (at least 12)
- Natural Communities shall be preserved and appropriately managed.

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- Project shall be maintained in a manner that protects and enhances listed and non-listed native species and their habitat.
- Ongoing monitoring and control program for invasive vegetation and nuisance native plant species.
- Feral animal removal program

Financial Liability

To date, the property management and operational costs, including tourist and educational activities, are being jointly funded through a variety of sources including federal, state, local, and private dollars. The Service has funded its property management costs using federal and private dollars. Should the City decide to continue its Management Agreement with Service, the Service has asked for a 20 year term for the Agreement, and in the event the City terminates the new Agreement, the Service requires that the City pay it back for the depreciated costs of capital improvements to the property installed or constructed after the new Management Agreement is in effect. It is our recommendation that, in the event the City terminates the new Agreement, the City should only be responsible for the depreciated value of the Capital Improvements funded through federally appropriated funds, and not any private or philanthropic funds. It is also our recommendation that should the Service terminate the Agreement, that the City not be responsible for paying back any of the funded capital improvements. The current proposed Management Plan provided by the Service is not consistent with these recommendations.

In the event the Service is no longer responsible for property management, federal funds may no longer be available to assist with property management or other capital improvement costs. Should the City choose to terminate the current Management Agreement with the Service, then the City, and local taxpayers, are liable for the full costs of property oversight, including, but not necessarily limited to the following: infrastructure improvements, daily maintenance and operational costs, transportation of the public to and from the site, invasive species control (animal and vegetative) and the hiring of on-site personnel (including the hiring or designation of current City staff as the Refuge Manager). The City may use a variety of funding sources to fulfill its financial obligations to carry out the performance obligations in the Declarations, including enterprise funds, CRA funds, grant funding or private philanthropy; however, ultimately, if alternative revenue sources are inadequate to meet the funding requirements for City's performance obligations, the City must be prepared to use general ad valorem tax revenue. To the extent that the City does not currently have the staff or capacity to perform its obligations under the Declarations, the City may incur additional financial burdens to either hire personnel or contract with individuals or businesses to carry out the obligations under the Declaration.

Personal Injury Liability

As with any city property, the City is subject to liability for injuries that occur on the property. Although the City is currently liable for damages associated with injuries occurring on the property, under the current Management Agreement, there is shared or joint liability with the Service. To the extent, the Service is no longer managing the property, or constructing any of the improvements, the City assumes sole liability for damages for injury to persons or property occurring at Three Sisters. The City does have statutory immunity, and has the capacity to insure itself against potential damages. If the City assumes management of Three Sisters, the City will

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need to evaluate its existing insurance coverage to ensure the City is adequately insured for any additional potential liability it may incur.

Environmental Liability

Since the Service has been managing Three Sisters, the Service has assumed liability for managing the environmental commitments and conditions of the property. Should the City choose to terminate its Management Agreement with the Service, the City will now have sole liability with respect to both environmental commitments under the Declarations and environmental conditions. For example, in 2015 the Service was sued by Public Employees for Environmental Responsibility (PEER) for "taking" of manatees as a result of permits it had issued for guided swim tours. If the City assumes sole management responsibility, the City will likely be a target for similar lawsuits. In addition, absent the Service's management of the Property, the City will have sole liability for the environmental management of the property to include planting and cultivating native species, monitoring and removing invasive species, and preserving the natural communities occurring on the property. Another legal concern arises out of the potential for environmental contamination. Activity or development on the property creates the risk or potential for environmental contamination. In the event an incident occurs causing contamination to the property, the City would have sole liability and responsibility for cleanup and mitigation.

Enforcement Concerns

Currently, the Service provides a certain level of enforcement on the property (and in the water) to include enforcement of federal law, particularly those regarding wildlife protection. If the City continues under a modified Management Agreement with the Service, a certain level of federal enforcement will continue to be provided. However, if the City terminates its Management Agreement with the Service, the City then assumes sole responsibility for enforcement of laws, ordinances and regulations on the landward portion of the property. It is currently understood that the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, under its interlocal agreement with the City, cannot enforce federal law; therefore, the City would need to evaluate how federal laws would be enforced on the property, particularly with respect to protected species. In addition, the City would have sole responsibility for enforcement of City rules and regulations as they apply to the property. It should be noted that while the Service will always maintain a presence in Crystal River, and on the bay, the level and responsiveness of such enforcement is unclear if the City assumes management responsibilities.

My name is Ed Flowers and I live in Crystal River.

A few months ago, I played my first Pickleball tournament in Lake City. It was held over a weekend and played on four couts. Players came in from TX, NC, TN, GA, and AL to participate. This brought in tourist money to local hotels, gas stations, RV parks, restaurants, local shops, etc.

Holding Pickleball tournaments in LeGrone Park would also allow players and their families to generate revenue at local businesses and tourist spots in Crystal River.

If I understand correctly, there are three (3) Pickleball court options on the table for discussion. I would like to provide my input on these options and present a 4th option to you.

Options:

1) Using the Basketball Court

- o There is a high cost to level off and resurface & paint the basketball court
- Additional cost to fence around the court
- This option would provide only two Pickleball courts
- Courts would face the wrong direction East/West instead of North/South
- Basketball players would lose their court

2) New Pickleball Court Construction

- The Chronicle stated \$45,000 for one court and \$65,000 for two courts
- This option provides 1-2 designated Pickleball courts, but 4 courts would better serve the community.
- The basketball court would remain
- All 4 tennis courts would remain

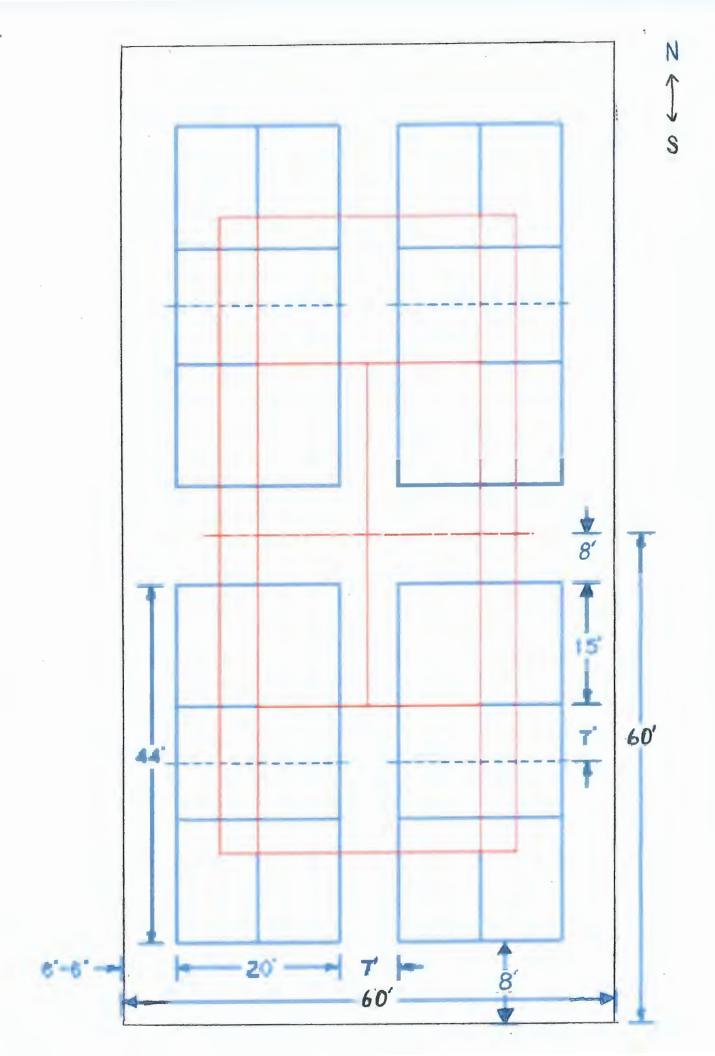
3) Temporarily Taping of ONE of the existing four Tennis Courts

- One Pickleball court is not sufficient for the 20+ players who usually show up with Pickleball groups.
- Temporary tape deteriorates from the elements and is time consuming to clean up and replace.

4) My Option - Repaint 4 Pickleball courts in the same amount of space of ONE tennis court (see attached diagram)

- This would allow 4 designated Pickleball courts
- Would allow courts for warm-up, beginners, intermediate, and extreme players to play all at the same time
- These courts would correctly face North and South
- This option would cost UNDER \$6,500
- This would allow enough courts for tournament play (such as youth tournaments, open tournaments, and senior tournaments).
- This option would retain the basketball court
- This option would still retain three (3) tennis courts

In closing, I hope you will consider the 4 court option, which will provide the most usage of the space available at the most reasonable cost. Thank you.

Summary: The Crystal River Land Development Code, specifically Section 4.04.02 – Minimum requirements for a Planned Unit Development (PUD) Zoning District, Section A. states that the minimum land area for a PUD shall be two (2) acres.

PUD's allow flexibility by allowing Developer's to depart from "cookie cutter" lot forms and setback requirements, therefore allowing more creative uses of open space and urban design. Having a minimum lot size of 2 acres will take away opportunities for the development of downtown properties that do not meet this requirement.

Our Land Development Code has been written to protect those areas of interest that may be of concern during the design process and allows both Planning Commission and City Council to be involved in the approval process.

Staff is requesting that the minimum land area for a PUD be removed from the LDC in order to allow better development of properties within the City of Crystal River. This does not change any of the other processes in establishing the PUD (Public Hearings, Development Agreements, etc.).

The Planning Commission recommended approval of the proposed Ordinance on May 3, 2018.

<u>Background</u>: [Agenda Sheet Requested Motion: Motion to award a three-year continuing contract for paving and related services to Pave-Rite, Inc. utilizing unit pricing: Group 1 = \$2,160.38; Group 2 = \$2,090.48; and Group 3 = \$2,098.95 subject to standard FDOT provisions for the adjustment of fuel and bituminous material cost fluctuations over the term of the contract.

Summary: The City budgets funds annually for general street/parking lot maintenance and resurfacing. Historically, this work has been let for competitive bid each year and the scope of work was limited to the specific roadway sections and/or parking lots identified in the bid documents.

This process did not allow for unforeseen projects like emergency roadway repairs that happen often with sink hole, water and sewer repairs. Under the purchasing policy staff is required to solicit three quotes, DPW has encountered difficulty in finding paving contractors who are willing to look at a repair areas and quote. To eliminate this hurdle and the potential for lower cost on smaller paving repairs, DPW is requesting the award of a three-year term continuing contract for paving and related services. Small projects are priced at Group 1 costs and for larger projects it would be Group 3.

If approved, DPW would enjoy the ability to quickly complete paving services as repairs arise --- similar to how we currently do for concrete and electrical work. Staff proposes to continue to bring major street selection with expected prices to Council for approval and the services would be paid out at the appropriate bid unit prices listed for Pave-Rite, Inc. (see attached).

In the interest of fairness and to be consistent with how FDOT operates the bid unit prices will be subject to adjustment for fuel and asphalt costs as they fluctuate over the three-year term. The calculation for the adjustment is to conform to FDOT's defined methodology which considers the date range between when the bid numbers were quoted and the time a project commences. The price adjustment can go up or down.

Workmanship and materials are to conform to FDOT's standard specifications and include a one-year contractor warranty.

PUBLIC WORKS:

Parks: Nothing new to report.

Personnel: Interviews were held for the mechanic position; that position has proven challenging to fill.

Facilities: Staff worked with Long & Associates to finalize a professional services agreement related to the feasibility study for a new City Hall for Council's consideration.

Public Water: US Water routinely fixes minor water line leaks --- no significant breaks this period.

Park Rangers

Hunter Springs Park: Park rangers received numerous calls related to reserving the pavilion at Hunter Springs Park; callers were advised to contact the Public Works Department for reservations. Compliance with parking was very good overall within and near Hunter Springs Park. Staff encountered several parking issues due to the high volume of people wanting to be closer to the park than the overflow area.

Park Ranger staff believes that signs are needed on NE 2nd Street near NE 1st Avenue showing additional parking area.

New signs were installed at the rock jetty advising people to NOT climb on the rocks; which appears fairly effective so far.

LeGrone Park: Two water leaks by the tennis courts were reported to Public Works and were fixed and problems with the bathroom auto locks were resolved by Public Works and Park Rangers.

Yeoman Park: The water issues were resolved and the park was re-opened.

Additional:

- Park Rangers answered questions regarding manatees and the area amenities through pubic interactions at the City parks.
- Staff erected warning signs for possible flooding during a tornado and flood watch.
- Damage occurred to the dock at Kings Bay that is used by the City and Sheriff Office. It
 was caused by a Manatee tour boat that came in very fast due to the storms and excessive
 winds. Proper personnel were informed.

 Park Ranger posted warnings on boat trailers parked on NW 1st Avenue (behind the Military Outlet). Park Ranger resolved the issue by talking with Kings Bay Lodge as one of their employees stated they were directing people to park there.

Three Sisters Springs

Three Sisters Springs had a total of 1,080 visitors in April, which was 300 less visitors than we had during April of last year. As manatee season ended, staff worked on projects to improve visitor services and ready for the next manatee season. Staff continued to work with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service on various projects, such as interpretive signage and improvement to road conditions.

Three Sisters Springs was featured in a documentary released by PBS called The Forgotten Coast: Wild Florida. This documentary explored many local attractions along the Nature Coast.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CRYSTAL RIVER, FLORIDA, **CITY AMENDING** THE **OF** CRYSTAL RIVER LAND DEVELOPMENT CODE. **CHAPTER** 4, SITE DESIGN SPECIFICALLY REQUIREMENTS; **SECTION** 4.04.02(A)BY ELIMINATING THE TWO (2) ACRE MINIMUM REQUIREMENT FOR A PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT (PUD); PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida recognizes the need to update and revise the City's Land Development Code relative to the regulation of Planned Unit Developments (PUD's; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Crystal River understands the importance and significance of having a well planned community within the City of Crystal River; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the law, the proposed amendment was required to be reviewed by the City's Local Planning Agency at a duly advertised meeting, scheduled on May 3, 2018; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida has determined that amending the City's Land Development Code is consistent with the goals, objectives and policies of the Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, The City of Crystal River has complied with all requirements and procedures of Florida law in processing and advertising this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida, has determined that adoption of this Ordinance is in the best interests of the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Crystal River.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CRYSTAL RIVER, FLORIDA THAT THE CITY'S LAND DEVELOPMENT CODE IS AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend the requirement for minimum land area for a Planned Unit Development (PUD) as set forth in the City of Crystal River Code of Ordinances, Appendix A, Land Development Code, Chapter 4 - Site Design, Section 4.04.02 Minimum requirements for a PUD

District; for the reasons set forth in the above "WHEREAS" clauses, which are incorporated herein, in haec verba.

SECTION 2. AUTHORITY.

The City of Crystal River City Council is authorized to amend the Crystal River Land Development Code pursuant to Article III of the City Charter of the City of Crystal River and Part II, Code of Ordinances, Chapter 1, General Provisions, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Crystal River, and as otherwise authorized by applicable Florida Statutes.

The City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida, hereby adopts and incorporates into this Ordinance the proposed amendment follows:

Chapter 4, Section 4.04.02(A) Minimum requirements for a PUD district as follows:

A. There is not a minimum land area requirement for a PUD.

SECTION 3. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance is held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not be construed as to render unconstitutional or invalid the remaining provision of the Ordinance.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage.

WHEREAS, the City of Crystal Code of Ordinances, specifically Chapter 20, Advisory Boards and Commissions, stipulates the number of appointed members for the Waterfront Advisory Board; and

WHEREAS, the Waterfront Board recently amended the Bylaws by changing the number of appointed members from twelve (12) to nine (9); and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida recognizes the need to update and revise the By-laws from time to time; and

WHEREAS, the City of Crystal River has complied with all requirements and procedures of Florida law in processing and advertising this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida, has determined that adoption of this Ordinance is in the best interests of the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Crystal River.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CRYSTAL RIVER, FLORIDA THAT THE CITY'S CODE OF ORDINANCES IS AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 20, Section 20-32 for the reasons set forth in the above "WHEREAS" clauses, which are incorporated herein, in haec verba.

SECTION 2. AUTHORITY.

The City of Crystal River City Council is authorized to amend the Crystal River Code of Ordinances pursuant to Article III of the City Charter of the City of Crystal River and Part II, Code of Ordinances,

Chapter 1, General Provisions, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Crystal River, and as otherwise authorized by applicable Florida Statutes.

The City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida, hereby adopts and incorporates into this Ordinance the proposed amendment to:

CHAPTER 20 - Chapter 20 - ADVISORY BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

Section 20-32 – Appointment

The waterfronts advisory board shall consist of nine (9) members appointed by the city council including five (5) members being residents of the city and two (2) members being residents of Citrus County plus two (2) alternate members. The board will include at least one (1) person from the following categories, when possible:

- (1) Dive/tourism industry;
- (2) Environmental specialist;
- (3) An attorney not employed by the city;
- (4) Financial services industry (i.e., banker, CPA, etc.);
- (5) Restaurateur/merchant/hotel operator;
- (6) Engineer, architect, builder or other construction professional;
- (7) Operation of a commercial fishing or related business.

The appointment of members to the waterfronts advisory board shall be made in such a manner that whenever possible, the terms of office of the members in categories (1) through (4) shall take place during alternating appointment cycles with members in categories (5) through (7).

SECTION 3. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance is held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not be construed as to render unconstitutional or invalid the remaining provision of the Ordinance.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITRUS COUNTY, FLORIDA AND

THE CITY OF CRYSTAL RIVER, FLORIDA

the State of Florida (hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY"), and the CITY OF CRYSTAL RIVER,									
FLORIDA, a municipal corporation of the State of Florida (hereinafter referred to as "CITY"), all									
collecti	ively referred to as	the "PARTIES".							

WHEREAS, the Parties presently maintain and operate emergency service departments, with firefighting, rescue, and emergency medical equipment with associated personnel; and;

WHEREAS, the Parties wish to enter into this Agreement for the provision of Automatic Aid and Mutual Aid; and

WHEREAS, the Parties hereto recognize and agree that it is desirable to enter into this Agreement for the mutual benefit of each party in times of emergency or disaster too great to be dealt with unassisted or in a situation in which a party may not be able to expeditiously respond due to commitments at the time of a particular incident or event; and;

WHEREAS, this Agreement is for the benefit of the general public and is authorized by and entered into pursuant to Chapter 163, Florida Statutes, and other applicable law.

NOW THEREFORE, incorporating the above recitals as stated herein, it is agreed by and between the Parties hereto that each of the Parties agree to assist the other pursuant to the following stipulations, provisions and conditions:

- 1. <u>Recitals.</u> The recitals set forth herein are accurate, correct and true, and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 2. <u>Definitions.</u> As used in this Agreement, the words defined immediately below shall have the meaning stated next to same. Words imparting the singular number include the plural number and vice versa, and the male gender shall include the female gender and vice versa, unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
 - (a) "Aiding Fire Rescue Department" means the fire rescue department providing Automatic or Mutual Aid to the Alarm Fire Rescue Department.
 - (b) "Alarm Fire Rescue Department" or "Agency" means the fire rescue department in whose jurisdiction the emergency occurs.

- (c) "Automatic Aid" means the automatic dispatch of pre-specified fire department apparatus with a minimum of two (2) personnel from the fire department providing the "aid" to the fire department primarily responsible for the property location.
- (d) "Mutual Aid" means a request for assistance and response by another jurisdiction for apparatus, equipment and/or personnel. Mutual Aid provides for the shared use of resources to properly manage large or multiple incidents. The requested responding units will be specified and a decision made by the Aiding Fire Rescue Department if resources are available to respond.
- (e) "Notification" means to inform the individual or the entity identified of knowledge of the incident. Notification in and of itself does not mandate response if the situation is under control by the units on scene.
- (f) "Structure Fire" means a fire involving the structural components of various types of residential, commercial, or industrial buildings. Residential buildings range from single-family detached homes and townhouses to apartments and tower blocks, or various commercial buildings ranging from offices to shopping malls. This is in contrast to vehicle fires, wildfires, or other outdoor fires.

3. Purpose and Intent.

- (a) The purpose and intent of this Agreement is for the Parties to provide the best service possible to residents of their respective jurisdiction to include Automatic Aid for a reported structure fire and Mutual Aid for reported fire alarms, medical emergencies, rescue scenarios, and brush fires. The Parties agree to provide such reciprocal assistance on an Automatic Aid and Mutual Aid basis based on availability. The Parties further agree to provide for Mutual Aid and Assistance by providing fire, rescue, emergency medical, hazardous material, technical rescue, and other similar emergency services in the event of disasters resulting from natural phenomena, accidents, or otherwise when the disaster is too great to be handled without assistance. The intent of this arrangement is to provide the most efficient life and property saving services to the citizens protected by the respective Parties. This Agreement is not intended and shall not be construed to in any way deprive a party of jurisdictional powers vested in said party, nor is it the intention of the Parties to combine their individual departments into a single department or district providing the services encompassed by this Agreement.
- (b) The City of Crystal River and Citrus County hereby agree that the Crystal River Fire Department and Citrus County Fire Rescue will provide primary fire protection services within their respective jurisdictions. For areas of automatic aid, it is expressly understood that the City of Crystal River is the primary responding and responsible agency for the municipal area of the municipality, and that Citrus County Fire Rescue is the primary responding and responsible agency for unincorporated areas that are outside of the municipality. The parties enter this Agreement with the understanding that Either Party's Level of Fire Service may be enhanced at a point in time. Should the level of service change or be enhanced,

- Citrus County Fire Rescue and the Crystal River Fire Department reserve the right to revisit the parameters for automatic aid, and if deemed appropriate, change the area of automatic aid as shown upon Appendix B.
- (c) The City of Crystal River agrees to utilize Citrus County Fire Rescue to respond automatically to structural fire responses in the area as defined in Appendix B, attached and incorporated as if stated herein.
- (d) Citrus County Fire Rescue agrees to utilize Crystal River Fire Department to respond automatically to structural fire responses in the area as defined in Appendix B, attached and incorporated as if stated herein.
- (e) Automatic or Mutual Aid structural firefighting apparatus shall be staffed with a minimum of two (2) State of Florida-compliant certified firefighters.
- (f) All apparatus responding pursuant to this Agreement will be fully serviceable and will meet the standards detailed in NFPA 1901.
- (g) All operations will be conducted based on adopted fire/rescue standards and NFPA 1500 safety standards.

4. Procedures for Requesting Emergency Assistance.

- (a) Responses to all emergencies shall be by request except as identified in Paragraph 3, sections (c) and (d). The company officer or higher authority of the Alarm Fire Rescue Department shall initiate the request. It is also recognized that in the interest of public safety this request may need to be made based upon dispatch information.
- (b) The Alarm Fire Rescue Department shall contact the providing Parties dispatch center via the information identified in the "Implementation Plan" attached as Appendix "A" to this Agreement and incorporated as if stated herein.
- (c) Responses to structure fires in the areas identified in Paragraph 3, sections (b) and (c) shall be automatic dispatch based upon the dispatch procedures of the Alarm Fire Rescue Department. No formal requests need to be made to initiate assistance. Response notification will be handled via the Citrus County Sheriff's Office Communication and Dispatch Center.

Duties and Level of Service.

- (a) No department, officer or employee of the Parties to this Agreement shall perform any function or service not within the scope of the duties of such department, officer or employee in its respective primary jurisdiction.
- (b) The rendition of service, standards of performance, discipline of officers and employees, and all other matters incident to the performance of services by command personnel and the command and control of their personnel and equipment shall remain with each party to this Agreement.

- (c) Disputes or disagreements as to the level of services and/or standards of performance shall be reported by the complaining party to the Fire Chief or his designee of the party that provided the service or took the action, from which the complaint arose, both departments shall meet to discuss and develop a resolution to the situation.
- (d) The decision of the Fire Chief of each party shall be final and conclusive as to the geographic boundaries of response, the level of services rendered or standards of performance observed by the party's personnel. The Parties agree that the Automatic Aid portion of this agreement will be reviewed and revised periodically. Any changes to the agreement shall be in writing and signed by the Parties. The map and description of the defined geographic is located in Appendix B. The Parties further agree that the Mutual Aid portion of this Agreement is applicable in any geographical region that is the primary response area of the Crystal River Fire Department or Citrus County Fire Rescue. A Fire Rescue Department providing Automatic Aid or Mutual Aid while within the jurisdiction of another Fire Rescue Department shall be subject to the orders and directions of the Incident Commander of the Local Authority where the emergency exists as follows:
 - 1. The Incident Commander in charge on scene of the emergency shall communicate orders and directions to the Aiding Fire Rescue Department's Officer in Charge via the designated radio channel or in person.
 - 2. The Alarm Fire Rescue Department shall maintain responsibility for the handling of the incident and supplying appropriate Command Staff. Should the need arise to utilize Automatic Aid or Mutual Aid commanding officers, the "Unified Command System" will be established and incident priorities will be established and incident priorities will be determined and executed.

6. Employee Status.

Persons employed by a party to this Agreement in the performance of services and functions pursuant to this Agreement shall have no claim against the other party to this Agreement for pension, worker's compensation, unemployment compensation, civil service, or any other employee rights or privileges granted by operation of law or otherwise to the officers and employees of the other party to this Agreement.

7. Liabilities and Responsibilities of Parties.

- (a) No party hereto, its respective officers or employees, shall assume any liability for the acts, omissions or negligence of the other party, its officers or employees.
- (b) All of the privileges and immunities from liability, exemptions from laws, ordinances and rules, and all pensions and relief, disability, worker's compensation and other benefits which apply to the activity of officers or employees of a party when performing their respective functions within the territorial limits for their respective agencies shall also apply to the same degree and extent to the performance of such functions and duties extraterritorially when accomplished pursuant to this Agreement.

- (c) Except as herein otherwise provided, all liability for injury to personnel and for loss or damage of equipment shall be borne by the party employing such personnel and owning such equipment.
- (d) The Parties, when providing emergency medical services shall work under the direction of their respective Agency's medical director and utilizing their respective BLS protocols.
- (e) Neither party shall be liable for any claims or damages occasioned by the negligent or intentional actions of the employees or agents of the other party. The Parties agree to hold the other party harmless from such claims to the extent authorized by Section 768.28 of Florida Statutes and fully retain all defenses and immunities provided by law with respect to any claim or action occurring as a result of this agreement.
- (f) By execution of this Agreement, neither party waives its sovereign immunity as provided by general law.

8. Response and Resource Utilization Review.

- (a) On a semi-annual basis the Fire Chief for Citrus County Fire Rescue and the Fire Chief for the Crystal River Fire Department shall meet and agree on the number of responses made by each jurisdiction in each of the categories listed in 3(d) above and submit those numbers to the respective parties subject to this agreement.
- (b) In the event a party finds the number of requested apparatus responses unacceptable, such party shall inform the other party in writing of its concerns and the parties shall meet within 15 calendar days of receipt of the written notice to discuss the issue and seek a remedy for its resolution.
- (c) Each party agrees to furnish necessary equipment, resources, and facilities in order to render Automatic and Mutual Aid services to the other party in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. However, neither party shall be required to deplete its own equipment, resources, facilities, and services in furnishing such mutual aid services.
- (d) Either Agency furnishing any equipment pursuant to this Agreement shall bear the costs for any loss or damage to such equipment and shall pay any expense incurred in the operations, maintenance, and repair of that equipment.
- (e) Either Agency furnishing aid pursuant to this Agreement shall fully compensate its employees during the time such aid is being given.
- (f) It shall be the responsibility of the Agency furnishing aid hereunder to notify the requesting party of any items for which reimbursement or replacement is requested. This notification shall include information regarding quantity used, manufacturer's name, local supplier, and specific item(s) used.

9. Term of Agreement.

This Agreement shall commence at 12:00 AM on the date of full execution of the Parties and continue through midnight on September 30, 2018, at which time this Agreement shall

automatically renew for one-year periods unless cancelled by either party, modified by mutual agreement of the Parties, or terminated by operation of law. This Agreement may be cancelled by either party giving the other party one hundred eighty (180) days written notice of its intent to cancel.

10. Public Records Requirements.

CITY will keep and maintain public records required by the COUNTY to perform the service. Upon request from the COUNTY's custodian of public records, CITY will provide the COUNTY with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time and at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Chapter 119, Florida Statues, or as otherwise provided by law. CITY will ensure that the public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the term of the Agreement and following completion of the Agreement if CITY does not transfer the records to the COUNTY. Upon completion of the Agreement, CITY will transfer, at no cost, to the COUNTY all public records in possession of the CITY or keep and maintain public records required by COUNTY to perform the service. If CITY transfers all public records to COUNTY upon completion of the Agreement, CITY shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. If CITY keeps and maintains public records upon completion of the Agreement, CITY shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to the COUNTY, upon request from the COUNTY's custodian of public records, in a format that is compatible with the information technology system of the COUNTY. If CITY does not comply with the COUNTY's request for public records, the COUNTY shall enforce the contract provisions in accordance with the contract and may cancel the contract.

11. Governing Law.

All questions, issues, or disputes arising out of or under this Agreement, shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida and State jurisdiction is hereby agreed by Party/Parties to be in Citrus County, Florida and Federal jurisdiction is hereby agreed by Party/Parties to be in the Middle District of Florida.

12. Implementation.

The Agency Fire Chiefs have met and prepared an implementation plan identified in the Appendix of this Agreement.

13. Authorization.

Pursuant to this Interlocal Agreement, each party hereto authorizes the other party to perform the duties and services required herein.

1) Request for Assistance

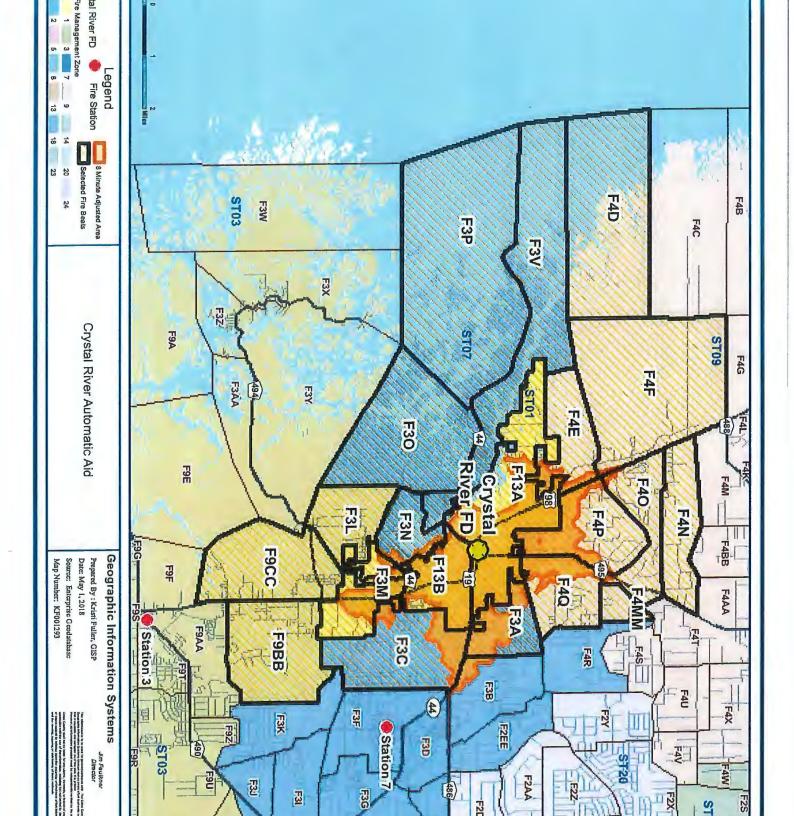
- a) Requests for assistance under this Agreement shall be made only for those areas within the respective jurisdictions for which each Agency is responsible; specifically, the City of Crystal River and unincorporated Citrus County as defined in Section 1 of this Agreement. The responding party will fulfill requests for Mutual Aid assistance from the requesting party at the sole discretion of the responding party's fire chief or designee.
- b) Each Agency, whether responding or requesting, shall be responsible for completing their respective incident reports. The responding party shall furnish a copy of their incident report to the Agency receiving aid upon request.
- c) The automatic aid response into another Parties' jurisdiction shall consist of a prespecified first alarm assignment. Engine responses shall consist of the staffing of two qualified personnel. Tanker responses shall consist of the staffing of one qualified personnel. Additional personnel or equipment must be requested by the Incident Commander. The response of additional personnel and equipment shall be at the discretion of the company officer of the Agency providing the response and based on availability of requested resources.
- d) Both Parties agree to abide the requirements found in Florida Administrative Code 69A-62 and provide only personnel who have attained a minimum of Firefighter I certification.

2) Types of Incidents

- a) Structure fires
- b) Reported fire alarms commercial and residential; (mutual aid by request only)
- Medical emergencies (BLS and with the possibility of providing ALS as needed)
- d) Rescue scenarios
- e) Brush fire
- f) Hazardous materials

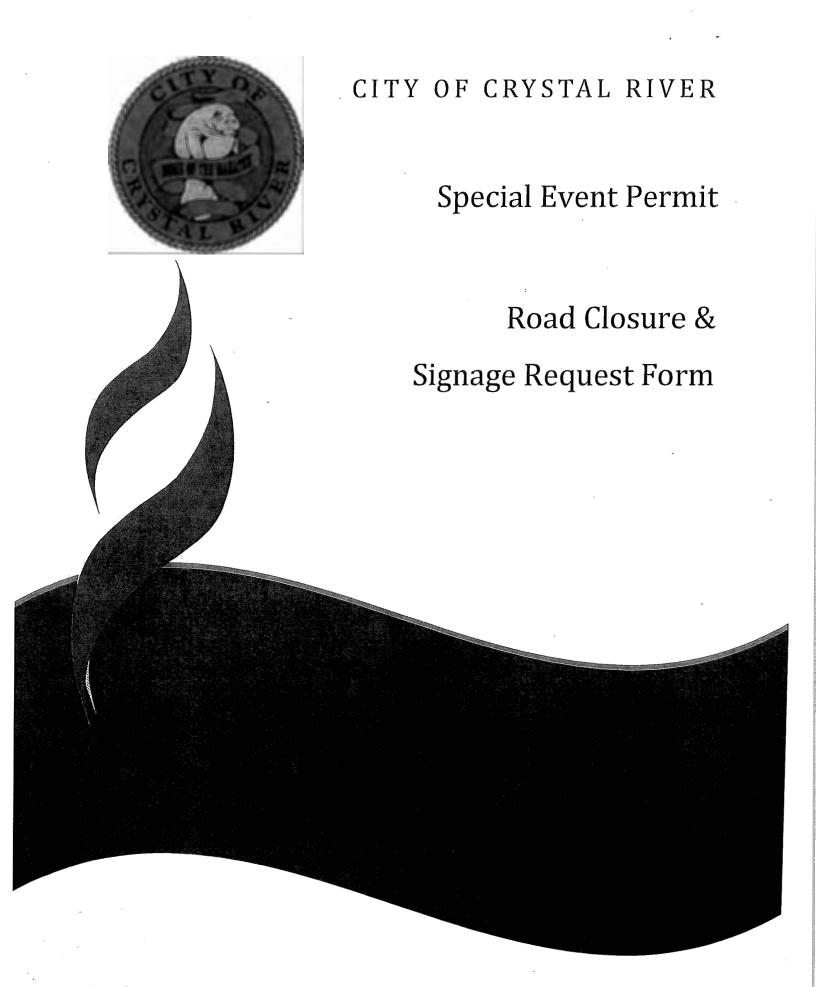

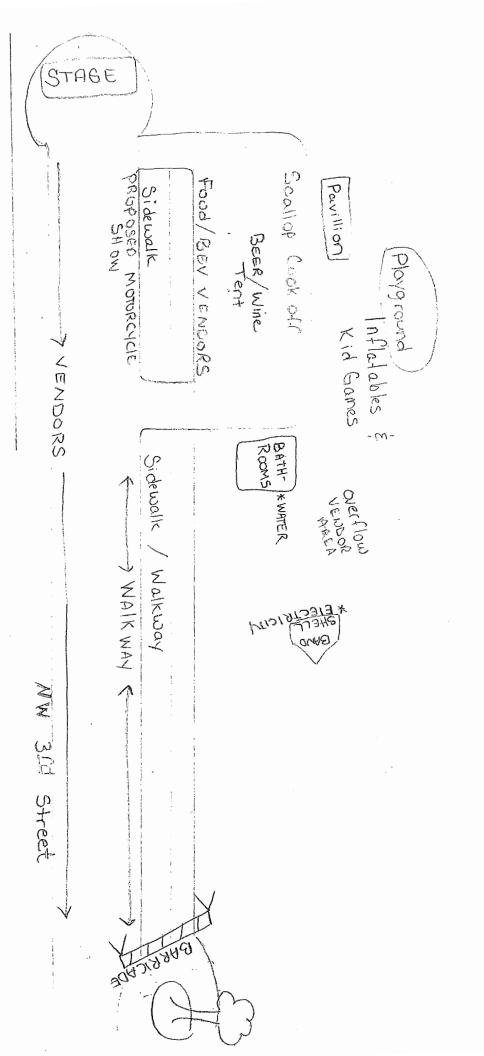

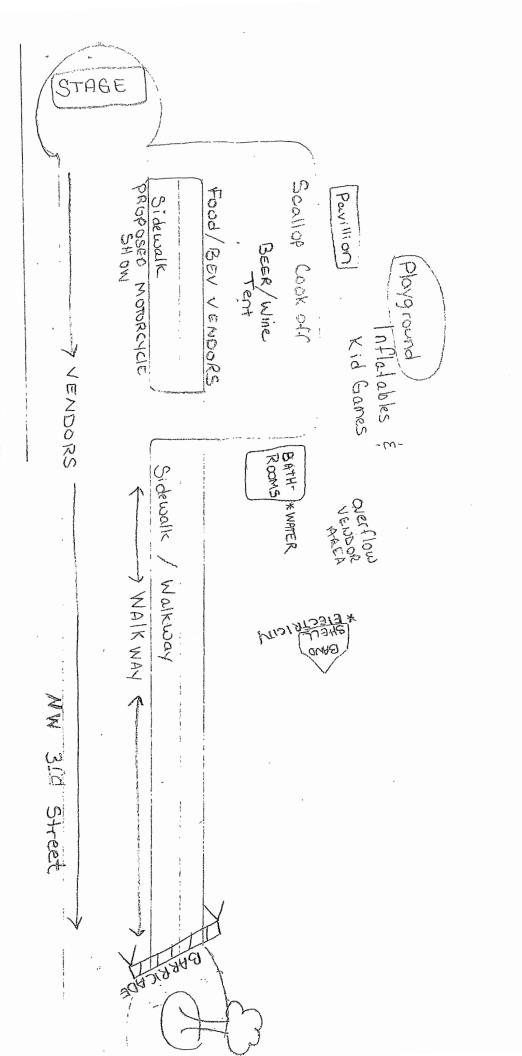

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida is responsible for the oversight of the budget of the City; and,

WHEREAS, staff is currently replacing the existing sidewalk railings in the Michigan Town area with a railing system that matches that of the Riverwalk. The impetus for the change was that the existing railing has historically been subjected to vandalism and has proven difficult to repair and maintain. The existing boardwalk and waterside walkway railings at Kings Bay Park consist of inferior pipe railing (which has also been subjected to vandalism) and the product that is currently being replaced in Michigan Town. For consistency with the Riverwalk and Michigan Town railing scheme, which is specified as a robust Westbury C80 VertiCable in silver, Staff estimated the required quantities and solicited a tax-exempt quote from three vendors. Finyl Sales, Inc., out of Ocala, FL was awarded as the supplier for the Michigan Town railing and satisfactorily delivered on that project. Staff requests an award to Finyl Sales, Inc. at the quoted unit prices in an amount not-to-exceed \$25,000 which will provide for a contingency allowance. Staff also requests an additional \$1,000 to purchase mounting hardware; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to appropriate the funds required to move forward with the expenditure;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida at a regular meeting held on the 29th day of May, 2018 that the Budget Amendment be made as shown in Exhibit A.

Requested Motion: Motion to adopt Resolution No. 18-R-17 and approve a piggyback purchase off Florida Sheriffs Association Cooperative Purchasing Program for a portable lift station bypass pump from Thompson Pump in the amount of \$60,723.00

Summary: The Utility relies on a trailer-mounted bypass pump for lift station repairs. Reliability of this critical piece of equipment is paramount especially during emergency situations where time is of the essence to ensure that sanitary sewer overflows do not occur. The city has one existing portable pump has recently become unreliable and has need for a high level of repair. It is also very loud and the auto-start float system also no longer works which requires the pump to run day and night when in service. It is Staff's (and U.S. Water's) opinion that the pump is nearing the end of its useful life and any repair costs would be better spent on a replacement. See attached photo --- the unit is worn out.

Since it's imperative to have a minimum of one bypass pump available at all times to handle situations as they arise, the Utility is currently renting a unit from Thompson Pump on a monthly basis at the rate of \$2,090 per month. Subject to Council approval of this request, there is up to a 16-week lead time from the date the order is placed. The resulting total duration for need of a rental unit could be as long as five months --- the rental costs could conceivably approach 1/5 of the cost of a new unit. With this in mind, Staff requested consideration and the pump manufacturer's municipal division has agreed to waive the rental cost commencing at the date the order is placed.

Staff proposes to piggyback purchase from Thompson Pump using the Florida Sheriffs Association Contract FSA17-VEH15.0, Specification #76 (attached) which was awarded through competitive bidding.

As referenced in the attached quote, the purchase includes a 24-month warranty, sound attenuated enclosure, additional UV protection against our sunny environment, compressor-assisted priming system (which is a necessity for some of our deeper lift stations), self-cleaning impeller, battery charger, electric brakes, hose package and rack, rear suction/discharge connections (which is beneficial in areas with obstructions and/or tight public right-of-ways). As a courtesy, Thompson Pump has included one-year of complimentary cellular service for the alarm auto-dialer that is compatible with the City's current system.

Thompson Pump is an ISO 9001 certified Florida-based manufacturer that has been in operation since 1970 and has earned a reputation as a leader in the industry. Their bypass pumps have been employed by lift station rehabilitation contractors on local projects and our rentals over the years have proven reliable; Staff recommends this purchase.

Requested Motion: Motion to approve a purchase from Barney's Pumps, Inc. in the amount of \$23,850.00 for the replacement of two (2) new submersible sewage pumps for Lift Station #34.

Summary: One of the two submersible wastewater pumps at Lift Station #34 has recently failed. Both of the existing pumps were installed in 1990 and are approaching end-of-useful life. The cost to repair the failed pump has been quoted as \$9,000 which is almost the cost of a new pump. Due to age, Staff recommends replacing both pumps at this time.

This master lift station is located adjacent to the DPW shop next to the mall. This station uses 40 Hp pumps which are the largest of all our 68 stations. This station receives flow from all of Woodland Estates, businesses along the east side of US-19 both north and south of Turkey Oak (including the mall), Smuggler's Cove, etc. This critical station is now running on the single remaining pump but the rental portable bypass pump is available on standby.

Pertinent to this request, Staff would like to recognize U.S. Water for its spirit of cooperation and for performance of work yet again outside the contract scope of services.

Our U.S. Water Project Manager, Chris Saliba, recently detected the sound of gurgling air at the wastewater treatment plant headworks --- an indication that a lift station's check valve was failing to shut tight. When this occurs, sewage within the pressurized forcemain system is allowed to dump back into the wetwell of the affected station. Consequently, in addition to normal influent flow, the pumps also have to handle some component of what they just discharged.

Mr. Saliba analyzed numerous lift stations and concluded that the faulty check was associated with the subject LS #34. It's difficult to say exactly when the valve started failing but it appears to have begun in late 2015. So, for the past couple of years, the already tired pumps have been running significantly more.

Due to age and deterioration, it was determined that the check valve could not be repaired. Because of the tight configuration of the large 10" discharge manifold as it sat within the precast valve vault, the entire assembly had to be lifted out of the vault. With it removed, it made sense to go ahead and replace the checks valves as well as the aged isolation valves. U.S. Water was very generous in offering to provide the labor which turned out to be a significant effort.

Before the manifold could be disconnected, it was necessary to install an isolation valve on the discharge forcemain outside of the vault (to prevent a sewage spill). To accomplish this, crews had to perform a midnight shutdown of nine lift stations connected to the network and have a pumper truck on standby in case the task took longer than expected.

Mission accomplished with no issues --- U.S. Water ended up paying overtime for work outside of their contracted scope of services and Staff appreciates the effort. Upon completion, the pump run times went from 9 hours a day down to just ½ an hour! With 40 Hp pumps, Staff expects to see a significant savings in electricity at this station. Staff has asked U.S. Water to add monthly preventative maintenance task to their routine lift station rounds to stethoscope for leaky check valves.

Staff solicited quotes for compatible 40 horsepower replacement pumps --- Mader Electric Motors quoted Wilo at \$12,886.00 each, and Barney's Pump quoted direct-replacement Hydromatic at \$11,850.00 plus \$75 shipping each. Aside from being the lowest price, Hydromatic pumps are proven and are used in the majority of the City's lift stations. The City has purchased numerous pumps from Barney's Pumps of Lakeland, FL and Staff recommends this purchase.

Requested Motion: Motion to adopt Resolution No. 18-R-18 approve a State-bid piggyback purchase from the Florida Department of Management Services "Construction and Industrial Equipment" Contract from Ring Power Systems in the amount of \$64,765.90 for a 200 kW Caterpillar generator and an additional expenditure of up to \$4,500 to allow for construction of an elevated generator pad and for the initial fueling of the generator.

Summary: Although unable to ascertain the model year of the existing water plant generator serving the City's single water treatment plant on Crystal Street appears dated. This critical piece of equipment has proven temperamental over many years and despite numerous repairs by multiple specialists, it remains unreliable.

On Sunday, April 15, 2018 the water treatment plant experienced a power outage and the generator failed to start. The result was a loss of water pressure to the entire service area. Since so many customers were affected, a reverse 911 call was necessary to promptly warn of a precautionary boil water notice.

With the complete loss of power, the County interconnect also did not open completely also contributing to loss of water pressure. The design calls for if the City's distribution system dropped below 60 PSI, water from the County system should have automatically started to flow at a reduced pressure.

Upon investigation, U.S. Water discovered that the interconnect valve is electrically actuated; the loss of power made the valve inoperable and stuck in the semi-closed position. To rectify this, the setting position of the actuator is no longer dependent on electricity to operate. Under this new configuration, the County interconnect is entirely passive since pressure differential alone will allow the valve to mechanically open. Testing has proven the new arrangement will function in the event of future power outages. This test will be added to the Preventive Maintenance program.

Although confidence in the County interconnection has been improved, County infrastructure is also subject to storm damage; redundancy through a backup generator is essential to ensure a reliable supply of potable and fire protection water flow while on the County interconnect is at a lower rate.

The existing 150 kW generator is slightly undersized when operating at full-load demand. In consideration of the Utility's Capital Improvement Plan, there is a possibility to increase one to three distribution pumps in the long range future. Staff recommends upsizing to a 200 kW unit which will accommodate our future needs through the generator's expected useful life of 20 plus years.

The \$64,765.90 quote includes a new Caterpillar diesel 200 kW generator with a 715 gallon belly tank (which will allow for 48-hours of run time at 100% load), a 150 MPH wind-rated sound enclosure, electrical connections, start-up load testing, two-year warranty, and crane service. To ensure the generator is installed well above the 100-year base flood elevation, Staff also anticipates expending up to \$2,500 for DPW crews to construct an elevated concrete generator pad and the cost to fill the large diesel tank is expected to be approximately \$2,000 (both are included in the "Project Cost" below).

In consideration of the Utility's Capital Improvement Plan to replace the existing 20 Hp jockey pump with a third 50 Hp high-service pump, Staff recommends upsizing to a 200 kW unit which will accommodate our future needs through the generator's expected useful life of 15 – 20 years; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to appropriate the funds required to move forward with the expenditure;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Crystal River, Florida at a regular meeting held on the 29th day of May, 2018 that the Budget Amendment be made as shown in Exhibit A.

Requested Motion: Motion to authorize Florida Rural Water Association to provide engineering assistance which includes the development of an application package to the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund for a low-interest loan for a complete water meter replacement program based on Advanced Metering Infrastructure technology, lead gooseneck mitigation, additional water main isolation valves, and; in consideration of these services, authorize a financial contribution to this association in an amount not to exceed \$19,500

Summary: The City's water utility suffers from significant water loss which can occur through leaks, meter inaccuracies, and even theft through unrecorded and unmetered connections. This loss --- known as non-revenue water --- has been very high for years. This was one of the reasons for changing Utility contractors in 2016. Based on investigations by U.S. Water and Public Works, it is believed most loss is through current meter inaccuracies and an aging distribution system. To put it in perspective, consider that our water plant pumps an average of 500 gallons per minute. At the current loss of 37%, almost 200 gallons leaves the plant *every minute* but doesn't appear in the end point meter tallies.

In the interest of water conservation, any time water loss exceeds 10%, SWFWMD requires a water audit. The Utility has been subjected to such for consecutive years. Despite being challenged by a limited budget, Staff has been able to satisfy the auditors by demonstrating a conscientious effort toward determining and reducing some of the water loss.

In addition to a responsibility to be good stewards of the environment, the Utility strives to keep rates low by reducing costs and lost revenue. To this end, and with the hope of getting out from under the water audit enforcement cloud, Staff recommends a complete meter change-out coupled with an aggressive leak detection and repair program.

Staff conferred with U.S. Water on this matter who in turn reached out to Florida Rural Water Association (FRWA). FRWA is a non-profit organization that receives subsidies from the EPA and FDEP to provide assistance to small communities in addressing similar challenges. FRWA has identified a potential funding source for the recommended programs through the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (SRF).

SRF is funded in part by EPA grants stemming from the Safe Drinking Water Act and is administered by the FDEP to provide low-interest loans with rates proportionate to the economic wherewithal of the community (the terms currently average a generous 1.3% over 20-years). Since Crystal River is not an economically-disadvantaged community, we do not qualify for discounted assistance. However, Staff believes that the improvements proposed to be located within the areas of the city where the Median Household Income is less than state average may qualify for up to 85% loan principal forgiveness. Because of our significant water loss, and since the improvements directly relate to reducing water loss, Staff is hopeful that *all* of the contemplated improvements qualify for partial loan forgiveness.

In order for SRF officials to make a formal determination, a detailed loan application (complete with supportive documents), must be submitted for review. FRWA has offered the services of their team of professionals and, by way of consideration, has requested a contribution in the amount of \$19,500 (which is a fraction of the typical consultant fees). This amount also covers the preparation of plans and specifications, bidding assistance, and services through construction (which include the arduous task of demonstrating compliance with Federal "Buy American" and Bacon-Davis wage rates). See attached for a detailed scope of services. In short, FRWA proposes to assist with:

<u>Leak Detection</u>: With over 50-miles of water mains and service leads, leaks can be expected in our aging distribution system. Since minor leaks can go unnoticed for years and, due to our porous karst geography, even significant leaks may not reveal themselves at the surface, a difficulty exists in locating leaks.

Recognizing this, U.S. Water has consulted with a specialist who has offered to perform a demonstration project here in the city to showcase their advanced acoustical leak detection technology. Their system works by installing noise sensors throughout a given study area. The sensors collect data during low demand nighttime hours and, through GPS-based software, identify areas worthy of investigation by triangulating the sound waves of water movement.

Pinpointing for exploratory digging is accomplished by using a microphone to amplify the sound of a leak. If the product works as advertised, U.S. Water has offered to purchase the system at no cost to the City (which will allow them to offer this service to other customers) and begin implementation throughout our service area at no charge to the City.

Once existing leaks are discovered (or future main breaks occur), the installation of additional valves will allow crews to better isolate sections to minimize the number of customers affected by the shut-offs for repair. Since valve installation is expensive (and may also qualify for partial principle forgiveness), Staff recommends incorporating the installation of additional valves into the loan application proposal.

Meter Replacements: As meters age, they tend to run more slowly which results in inaccurate measurement. U.S. Water has flow tested random meters throughout the city and has concluded that under-reporting inaccuracies do in fact exist --- especially in the large commercial meters (where minor errors can add up significantly over time).

There are currently four methods available for water meter reading: manual read, touch read, Automatic Meter Reading (AMR), and Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI). Currently, most of the City's meters are read by touch (a rod tip is placed in contact with a sending unit located on top of the meter box) but some are still read by physically opening the box and hand recording the numbers off the registers. A meter reader drives to the 3,000+ meter locations each and every month to perform a read --- an inefficient approach that leaves a significant carbon footprint (fuel costs alone are approximately \$200 per month). Also, safety is a consideration --- be it dogs or biting critters lying in wait in the meter box. The fact that meter readers also have to traverse private property to read meters located in rear yards --- with fear of being mistaken for a trespasser --- is also disconcerting.

AMR uses 1990's drive-by radio technology that is being slowly phased out. AMI, on the other hand, is a state-of-the-art wireless system that offers an investment in the future.

AMI provides more tools for improved customer service, better registering of flow, and live leak detection including automatic notification for quick resolution. Data is automatically sent to a customer information system that provides a platform through which customers can accurately track their hourly water usage, pay their utility bill, etc. The City regularly has residents that have used a tremendous amount of water because of a leak or leaving a hose bibb open. This would greatly reduce these unexpected costs to residents.

AMI also helps identify irregularities and ensures that all customers are paying their fair share. It has the ability to send advance notification to a delinquent customer forewarning of shut-off date if payment is not received. Customer Service even has the ability to shut-off (or restore) water service right from the office thereby reducing conflict at the customer's home at the time of shutoff.

As water conservation continues to be a critical issue, giving customers a way to track their own usage helps them recognize the value of this limited resource and better appreciate the effect careless consumption has on their pocketbook. Typical projected payback periods for AMI are a short 5 - 7 years. However, since a possibility exists for partial principal forgiveness, our return period could be significantly shorter. With AMI systems having a lifecycle of 15 - 20 years, the investment will continue to reward for years to come.

<u>Lead Goosenecks</u>: Although the recent random sampling of household tap water did not reveal an indication of lead contamination in the water system, there is a possibility for the existence of lead goosenecks on some older sections of the distribution system. U.S. Water has identified possible connections that should be investigated for lead pipe. As a stand-alone task, uncovering each service tap is onerous but can be abated if performed in conjunction with a meter change out. 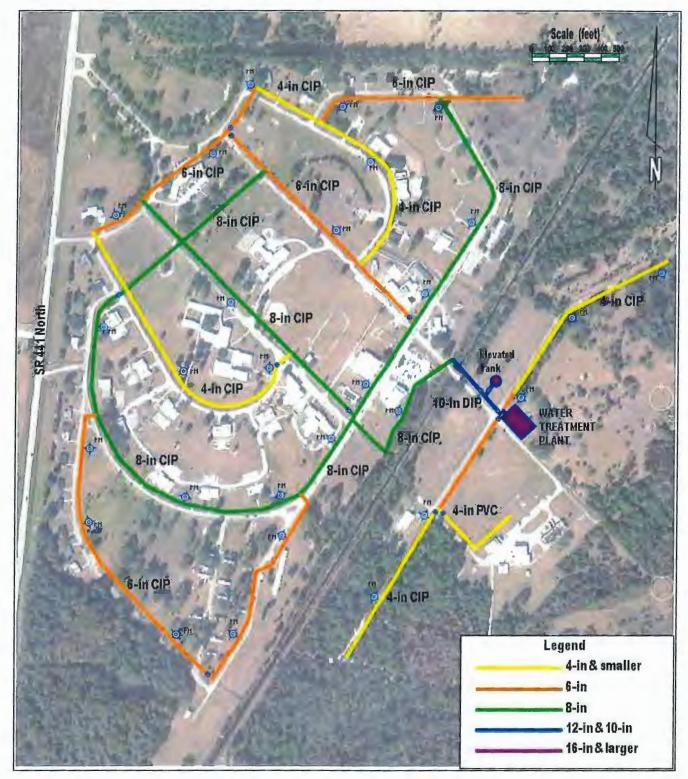

Requested Motion: Motion to approve the purchase of real property and due diligence costs for the property located at 148 NE 5th ST.; Crystal River, FL in the amount of \$110,085.00 and to authorize the City Manager to execute the closing documents after legal review.

Summary: On January 22, 2018 Council authorized Staff to move forward with negotiations for the purchase of the former Coast Guard Auxiliary site located at 148 NE 5th ST.; Crystal River, FL with the goal of securing it for the appraised value of \$105,000.00. The negotiations proved fruitful and the seller agreed to lower the asking price to this amount. According to the most-recent warranty deed, the legal description of the property is:

Lots 13, 14, 15, 16, and 17, BARCO'S ADDITION TO CRYSTAL RIVER, according to plat thereof recorded in Plat Book 2, Page 2, of the public records of Citrus County, Florida, LESS AND EXCEPT any portion of said land deeded to the City of Crystal River, a municipal corporation under the laws of the State of Florida in Official Record Book 548, Page 2009, public records of Citrus County, Florida.

As a precaution, Staff requested a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment, an asbestos survey, and a lead-based paint survey. These assessments were performed by Michael G. Czerwinski, P.A. in association with Universal Engineering Sciences, Inc. at a total cost of \$5,050.00 --- the abbreviated findings are as follows:

- 1) No evidence was found of Recognized Environmental Conditions with respect to past or current uses.
- 2) There is no evidence of potential PCB-containing equipment within the subject property.

- 3) No evidence was found to indicate the presence of obvious surface discharges (e.g. stained soil, aboveground or underground storage tanks, unusual odors, etc.).
- 4) Although evidence was discovered of two Solid Waste/Landfill Facilities and 18 leaking underground Storage Tank Facilities within the ASTM minimum search distances, the report concluded that the potential for contamination of the subject site as a result of these facilities appears to be low.
- 5) No actionable findings of lead-based paint.
- 6) Asbestos was discovered in the roof mastic of the smaller building but, due to the small size of the structure, the only duty to the owner is to advise a contractor of its presence prior to demolition.

CITY OF CRYSTAL RIVER, FLORIDA NOTICE AND ORDER OF BUILDING OFFICIAL

NOTICE

The NOTICE AND ORDER is in accordance with the City of Crystal River Code of Ordinances, Chapter 6 Buildings, Article XIV – Abatement of Dangerous Buildings, Sec. 6-167 - The 1997 Uniform Code for the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings.

The Building Official for the City of Crystal River has found the structure located at <u>1451 NW 19th Street</u>, <u>Crystal River</u>, <u>FL</u>, to be <u>dangerous</u> under the provisions of Section 302 of the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings. On September 2, 2016, Hurricane Hermine brought 3' of flood waters into the structure for duration of an estimated 8 hours. On April 11, 2017 a letter was submitted to Timothy & Diana Edge notifying them that the structure exceeded the 50% threshold for repair. The Substantial Damage Determination was made based on affidavits from both the Owner and Contractor attesting to the damage.

The following sections of the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings have been violated therefor rendering the structure as "dangerous", specifically as follows:

Section 302(4): Whenever any portion thereof has been damaged by fire, earthquake, wind, and flood or by any other cause, to such an extent that the structural strength or stability thereof is materially less than it was before such catastrophe and is less than the minimum requirements of the Building Code for new buildings of similar structure, purpose or location.

Section 302(5): Whenever any portion or member or appurtenance thereof is likely to fail, or to become detached or dislodged, or to collapse and thereby injure persons or damage property. Section 302(6): Whenever any portion of a building, or any member, appurtenance or ornamentation on the exterior thereof is not of sufficient strength or stability, or is not so anchored, attached or fastened in placed so as to be capable of resisting a wind pressure of one half of that specified in the Building Code for new buildings of similar structure, purpose or location without exceeding the working stresses permitted in the Building Code for such buildings.

Section 302(8): Whenever the building or structure, or any portion thereof, because of (i) dilapidation, deterioration or decay; (ii) faulty construction; (iii) the removal, movement or instability of any portion of the ground necessary for the purpose of supporting such building; (iv) the deterioration, decay or inadequacy of its foundation; or (v) any other cause, is likely to partially or completely collapse.

Section 302(9): Whenever, for any reason, the building or structure, or any portion thereof, is manifestly unsafe for the purpose for which it is being used.

Section 302(12): Whenever the building or structure has been so damaged by fire, wind, earthquake or \pm flood, or has become so dilapidated or deteriorated as to become (i) an attractive unisance to children;

(ii) a harbor for vagrants, criminals or immoral persons; or as to (iii) enable persons to resort thereto for the purpose of committing unlawful or immoral acts.

Section 302(13): Whenever any building or structure has been constructed, exists or is maintained in violation of any specific requirement or prohibition applicable to such building or structure provided by the building regulations of this jurisdiction, as specified in the Building Code or Housing Code, or of any law or ordinance of this state or jurisdiction relating to the condition, location or structure of buildings.

Section 302(18): Whenever any portion of a building or structure remains on a site after the demolition or destruction of the building or structure or whenever any building or structure is abandoned for a period in excess of six months so as to constitute such building or portion thereof an attractive nuisance or hazard to the public.

In accordance with the City of Crystal River Code of Ordinances, Chapter 6 Buildings, Article XIV -Abatement of Dangerous Buildings, Sec. 6-167 - The 1997 Uniform Code for the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings, Sections 302(4); 302(5); 302(6); 302(8); 302(9); 302(12); 302(13); and 302(18) described above, the Building Official for the City of Crystal River, Florida issues the following order:

ORDERED:

The Building Official has determined that the structure as shown on Exhibit "A" attached hereto be repaired in accordance with the current State Building Code and that the site plan be in accordance with the City of Crystal River Land Development Codes and that all required permits be secured therefor and the work physically commenced within such time not to exceed 60 days from the date of this order.

If at the option of the owner the building is to be demolished, the demolition permit must be obtained 60 days from the date of this order.

Any persons having any record title or legal interest in this structure may appeal from the Notice and Order or any action of the Building Official to the Board of Appeals, provided the appeal is made in writing and file with the Building Official within 30 days from the date of service of such Notice and Order; and failure to appeal will constitute a waiver of all rights to an administrative hearing and determination of the matter.
